MICHAEL ATIYAH

Michael Atiyah is a famous mathematician. Amazingly, he single-handedly changed the face of differential geometry. He studied in Cambridge where he became a fellow of Trinity College and later held professorships at Princeton and Oxford. He also studied topology and is best-known for his work on K-theory Atiyah-Singer the Index Theorem. He was awarded a Fields Medal in 1966. He retired from the mastership of Trinity College Cambridge to live in Scotland.

ALBERT EINSTEIN

You will probably be aware of Einstein's Equation ($E=mc^2$) which revolutionised the way people thought about maths. He was born on the 14th of March 1879 and died on the 18th of April 1955 when he was 76 years old. He was fascinated by how magnets move in compasses and thought about this when he was older.

LEGAL EAGLES



Do you ever wonder who is actually behind convincing judges to sway one way or another? Well, the person doing that is a barrister. In their wigs and gowns they go to court and either defend (or prosecute) the person in question and try to persuade the judges and (in criminal courts) the jury, to go their way.

Today, an interview has been conducted with Tom Roysten, a barrister (although, to be fair, they are only one of the people that make it happen). You will find out the answers to many questions you wouldn't have ever thought to ask and explore the life of a lawyer (the kind of thing that a barrister is)...

LUCY O'BRIEN Does your job make you happy?

TOM ROYSTON [BARRISTER] Yes, when...something that seemed unfair is avoided, or corrected, or when I don't understand something and then I think about it lots, then I understand it and, yeah, that feeling makes me happy.

LUCY Do you actually have to wear a wig?

TOM Yes, some of the time, in the high court of appeal, you still wear wigs. You also wear a black gown and collar tabs and a wing collar.

LUCY How long did it take you to become a barrister?

TOM Well, you have to do a degree at university, a year of studying barristers, then a year of following round a Senior barrister, so,

altogether, it would amount to six years, but, I don't think I would've become a barrister if I hadn't worked five or six years at citizens advice bureau, where I got to try and help people in a less trained way, but it made me think about what kinds of law I preferred, for example, not working for the very, very rich, which is what most lawyers tend to do, just so they can get more money.

LUCY What is the funniest case you have ever witnessed?

TOM When I was first training to be a barrister, when the judge started talking, and we had to stand up and I - obviously feeling very nervous - stood up very clumsily and somehow, managed to knock the jug (that the barristers drink from) over and it went all over my opponent's papers, and, the judge obviously thought it was him [the opponent] because he was soaking and I obviously couldn't say anything and neither could he because it would look rather silly shouting, "It was him your honour!"

We could also see from the Judge's expression that he thought he was just clumsy. But that didn't help because I lost that case.

LUCY What is the furthest you have ever had to travel for a case?

TOM Ooh, probably the European court of justice, which is in Luxembourg. And also it was probably the biggest courtroom I have ever been in, because they

have a lot of judges and interpreters, to translate it to any of the languages in the European union and put headphones on to listen to those versions in those different languages of what's happening.

LUCY Have you ever got an award for this job?

TOM Although, yes I have, I don't think it has had much reflection to success, really, it was just luck. I mean I got a couple of awards, for example, legal aid lawyer of the year and lawyer of the week in a national newspaper for a case I don't think I did all that well in, because I later lost.

LUCY What kind of cases do you usually deal with?

TOM Cases to do with homelessness, things to do with social security-children, retired people or ill and disabled people.

LUCY Is this the only job you've ever had?

TOM Errm, no. I worked in a pub, I worked in the Citizens Advice Bureau and as a teacher, but, this is ,by far, my favourite job.

LUCY How long have you been doing this job?

TOM Since 2012, just before my eldest was born. Once, because of lack of sleep, I fell asleep on a train between Manchester and London, one of the few times I've been late for court. Luckily, the judge and my opponent just found it funny.

LUCY What inspired you to be a barrister?

TOM Working at the Citizens Advice Bureau.

So, now we know a lot more details about how it works and have, hopefully, got you thinking. Being a barrister is actually not as easy as it seems.

CYBERBULLYING: MORE THAN A GLITCH

A TRUE GLOBAL SUPERSTAR, TAYLOR SWIFT HAS HAD A LOT OF ATTENTION – BUT THAT’S NOT ALWAYS A GOOD THING AS REPORTER DARCY FINDS OUT.

Taylor Swift has had a very exciting start to 2024, with the Golden Globes, and, more recently, the Grammys. After announcing her new album (*The Tortured Poets Department*) and winning Album of the Year, she has had a lot of attention – but that’s not always a good thing.

Taylor Swift rose to fame when she was only 16, with her self-titled country album, which gave her a relatable ‘girl-next-door vibe’. She then released three more albums, *Fearless*, *Speak Now* and *Red*, which each included country-pop elements. Then, completely switching genres, she released *1989*, which was a synth-pop album. During

the 1989 ‘era’, Taylor was involved in a public argument between Kanye West and Kim Kardashian over lyrics in Kanye’s songs. This (and other things) lead her to hide from the public for over a year until the release of *Reputation*. From 2019 to now, she has released four more albums: *Lover*, another pop album, *Folklore* and *Evermore*, which are indie-pop and folk albums, and *Midnights*, which is an electropop album.

On Sunday 7th January, Taylor attended The Golden Globes dressed in a snake-green Gucci dress, which sparked excitement in Swifties, who were confused at whether she was hinting at the re-record of *Reputation* or her self-titled debut album. The 13-time grammy winner is on a ‘quest’ to re-record her first six albums after her masters were sold to record executive Scooter Braun without her permission, and she has already re-recorded *Fearless*, *Red*, *Speak Now* and *1989* – marking all of these with ‘(Taylor’s Version)’. *Reputation* and *Debut* are the only albums left to be re-recorded, and both prominently use green in their designs.

GOLDEN GLOBES

All eyes were on Taylor, but that’s not always a good thing. The host of the Golden Globes, Jo Koy, made a very rude joke about Taylor, stating, “The big difference

between the Golden Globes and the NFL? On the Golden Globes, we have fewer camera shots of Taylor Swift.” This was a reference to her boyfriend, Travis Kelce, who is an American Footballer. When she attended his games, the cameras were always on her, and this has upset NFL fans, who would like to focus more on the game and less on Taylor.

Since the beginning of her career, many people have believed that Taylor is only famous because of her boyfriends and that is all she writes about, which is not true at all. It seems that this has deeply upset her, as she has said, “No one says that about Ed Sheeran. No one says that about Bruno Mars. They’re all writing songs about their exes, their current girlfriends, their love life, and no one raises the red flag there.” Many of her songs are about things other than her relationships: *Tied Together with a Smile* from her debut album is about her friend’s struggles with her health; *Marjorie* from *Evermore* is about her grandmother, and many other songs are about her family and about the sexism that she has faced.

Many people believe that fame makes you happy, but that is almost never the case. Taylor’s songs prove that, while she is one of the most influential people of the 21st Century, she still has insecurities, and she is

still affected by comments that people make about her. Over time, her albums have gradually become slower and more downbeat, from country and lively pop to slower indie and folk music, and this shows how others’ comments can affect you. Her songs used to be fast and happy, (*Stay, Stay, Stay* and *Welcome to New York*), but now they are slow, and honest (*This is Me Trying* and *Happiness*).

Online, whether it’s YouTube, Instagram or any other online platform, there are many videos and comments saying unkind things about Taylor. It is okay to dislike her music, and it’s fine to have your own opinion about her, but the words that you use may affect other people and that is not okay. It’s normal for people to have different opinions, but that could sometimes lead to people to become upset.

As long as you share your opinion respectfully and not in a negative way, you can share your views with others. It is important to celebrate your differences in a kind and respectful way, and we should always respect others.

CYBERBULLYING

When views are shared online in an unkind way, this can be called cyberbullying. Cyberbullying, or trolling, is a type of bullying that happens online, through text, social media or online games. Cyberbullying can be

spreading lies about someone, posting embarrassing photos or videos of someone without their consent, sending hurtful or threatening messages, images or videos to someone or impersonating someone and sending mean messages from fake accounts. It can happen to anyone, and can be very upsetting, and can affect people’s mental health. If you are being cyberbullied, you can tell a trusted adult and they can help you deal with it, by reporting and blocking whoever is bullying you.

Many people believe that *The Tortured Poets*

Department (TTPD) will reflect her experiences in the past few years on tour, online, and going through a breakup with her ex-boyfriend of six years, Joe Alwyn. The ‘track five’ of her albums have a reputation for being the most emotional track of the album, and the fifth song on TTPD has been revealed to be titled ‘*So Long, London*’. This is said to be a reference to her *Lover* track, *London Boy*. In the ‘bubblegum pop’ song, she sings about the different places in London that she loves to go to with her boyfriend. Swifties guess

that *So Long London* will be a parallel to that, saying it will be very similar, but it will have an emotional side to it.

Another thing people have been upset about is how many different variants TTPD has.
